National Wildlife Refuge Week

Join us at the Monte Vista National Wildlife Refuge to explore this vital habitat for plants and animals. A habitat is the home of plants and animals that supplies food and shelter. Where is your habitat?

You will explore the habitat on the Monte Vista Refuge Tour Loop. As you
go along, stop at the numbered signs, and look for wildlife activity. Get
out of your car to make observations and fill out the activity sheet for
each station. Begin at the yellow gate entrance to the Monte Vista

You cannot tell a male crane from a female. They look the same. Cranes bond for life.

- What time of day are you here now? answer_____
- Cranes feed in field from sunrise to mid-morning and again in the late afternoon to sunset. Can you see them eating?
- From 10:00-4:00 cranes loaf around in the wet meadows and feed on bug and roots. What else do you think they might eat?_____
- At night cranes roost in shallow water. Why do you think they need water to stand in when they sleep?_____
- When cranes take off from the ground they flap their wings until they find warm rising air, called a thermal. Hundreds of birds will do this together to gain altitude. It is a wonderful sight to see. Did you see this?
